Driving in Winter Conditions

Can you believe it is winter season already? I feel like lately the nice weather days are on fast forward and we are bracing for snow storms again. If you are reading this, let safety know to be entered to win something.

- Proper supplies in the truck include things like: extra clothing with layers, gloves, flashlight, rain gear, windshield fluid, blankets, sand/salt, jumper cables, snow scrapers/brushes, and food.
- Slow down- The slower you drive, the more time you have

- to react. Hydroplaning is also caused by going too fast.
 Avoid winter accidents by watching your speed.
- Keep a Firm Grip on the Wheel- This allows you to maintain control. Keeping both hands on the wheel at all times to guide the vehicle through snow and ice.
- Allow Safe Space- I know that keeping a safe stopping distance can be difficult, but it important to when the weather is good but especially important when driving in the winter.
- Avoid Black Ice- Black Ice is

not just found on bridges. It is a layer of



transparent ice that makes the road look wet. Drivers can spot black ice when the spray from other vehicles stops. You can also watch for frost on your truck antennae and mirrors.

 Brake Slowly- In winter, accelerate and brake slowly. If the truck is not equipped with an ABS braking system, lightly pump the brakes when you need to slow down.

Always remember, shut down when there is too much ice, snow, or driving winds.
